


Figure 2: New Graduate House in relation to the surrounding buildings in the campus precincts of Garran and Liversidge.




Figure 3: Configuration of New Graduate House in relation to University House to the east and Eggleston Road to the west.

Brief Historical Overview

With the expansion of the graduate population of the ANU, a new accommodation building was required and Project Coordination (Australia) Pty Ltd were contracted to oversee the building of (New) Graduate House (An existing building known as Graduate House was constructed in 1971 on Northbourne Avenue). (New) Graduate House was completed and officially opened in November 1998.

(New) Graduate House provides single and limited double self-catered accommodation for fulltime postgraduate students of the ANU. Accommodation is also available to visiting graduate students from other universities.

The building includes sculpted screens by the Sydney artist Michael Snape. These custom screens have been reported on in publications such as 'Industry Review' and the 'Sydney Morning Herald'. The works came to a cost of \$30,657.99.



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


Figure 4: 1998 Site plan for (New) Graduate House designed by Cox Architects and built by Project Coordination (Australia). Construction was completed in 1998.

Description of Graduate House

Building

(New) Graduate House is a three storey complex on a sloping site. It is constructed of a concrete slab with Boral bricks, roofed with Pioneer clear glazed terracotta roof tiles. Doors, windows and external plumbing are powder coated metal. Internal cladding is white painted plasterboard with the common room clad in painted timber. Rooms are self-contained with single side hung opening windows on second and third floor. Ground floor rooms have aluminium framed sliding glass doors opening onto internal courtyards. Internal furnishings are standard throughout.

Landscape

The area around (New) Graduate House is heavily landscaped with five internal courtyards and rose garden area by the front entrance. Bedded gardens run along the eastern wall with a pebbled cement walkway separating the (New) Graduate and University House properties.




Figure 6: Detail of Michael Snape's decorative screens on the east face of the building. (Source: ANU Heritage Office 2011)

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Management Issues

Constraints and Opportunities

As (New) Graduate House Building is of neutral significance, no constraints are noted.

(New) Graduate House is ranked as being of 'Neutral' significance as it does not embody, reflect or demonstrate Commonwealth or National Heritage values. The building makes no contribution to the site nor does it detract from the overall heritage values of the ANU Acton campus.

The **Tolerance for Change** heritage management tool, outlined in Section 7.6 of the ANU Action Campus Heritage Study 2012, will assist in conserving heritage values through a process of change. (New) Graduate House is able to tolerate a substantial amount of change through development. Removal of neutral elements is not necessary unless it allows for heritage values of the campus to be regained, reinforced or conserved.

As (New) Graduate House is of neutral significance, no opportunities are noted.

Recommendations

Photographic recording for the ANU archives should be undertaken prior to substantial change to buildings or landscaping in any future development.
